
## FAMILY SERVICES

The Early Head Start program utilizes the *Creative Curriculum for Infants, Toddlers, and Twos*, while the Head Start program implements the *Creative Curriculum for Preschoolers*. Both curricula are intentionally designed to support individualized learning and development across all domains outlined in the Head Start Early Learning Outcomes Framework (Birth to Five). Additionally, they emphasize the importance of family engagement in children's learning, supported through parent-child interactive supplemental curriculum *ReadyRosie*.


Program data is aligned with school readiness goals, aiming for 80% of children to meet or exceed widely held expectations across all developmental areas. During the spring checkpoint reporting period, expectations may be higher than in earlier periods, reflecting consistent implementation of the curriculum and positive teacher-child interactions. That data is used to inform and support continuous program improvement.



Mississippi County, Arkansas Economic Opportunity Commission Inc. (MCAEOC), partnered with the Blytheville School District in February 2024 to host the second Annual Mississippi County 8th Grade Career Day 2024. There were 234 students who participated, and MCAEOC staff, many vendors, and community partners volunteered and dedicated their time to making this event great.



Mississippi County, Arkansas Economic Opportunity Commission Inc. (MCAEOC), partnered with Nucor in May 2024 for the 2<sup>nd</sup> Annual Blytheville High School Leadership Conference. for this event. There were 280 students ranging from 9th to 12th grade who participated. There was a guest speaker, a state representative, mayors, and community partners. Some of the breakout session's topics were the following: Peer Pressure, Relationship Building and Domestic Violence, ACT Prep, Employment Skills, Banking & Money Management, Health, Wellness & Hygiene's, Bullying and Drug Prevention, Mental Health, and Anti-Violence and Safety and Bullying Intervention.



Mississippi County, Arkansas Economic Opportunity Commission Inc. (MCAEOC), awarded five high school seniors in Mississippi County a \$1,000 scholarship to help ease the financial burden of higher education expenses. The students can use the scholarship to support their educational goals and career aspirations. Congratulations to this year's MCAEOC recipients.



Saturday, September 21, 2024, at the Greyhound Bus Station in Blytheville, Arkansas, the **Color for Cancer 5K Run/Walk** was held. It was hosted by the MCAEOC Cancer Council and Nucor Steel Arkansas Rolling for a Cure Relay Life Team. This event aimed to promote awareness, celebrate cancer survivors, and raise money to assist cancer patients residing in Mississippi County. MCAEOC Cancer Council raised over \$8000.00, and all proceeds raised will help our fellow citizens who are affected by this disease receive some form of assistance. MCAEOC Cancer Council provided gas cards, helped subsidize medication costs, and paid for other supplies and expenses for cancer patients. Nucor Steel brought additional screenings, such as the Cardio-Optic Van, and their cooking for the cure team, which provided hamburgers, hot dogs, chips, and beverages. There were Colon Cancer screening tests, eight vendors, a photo booth, paint stations, games, and a survivor station. There were 243 participants.

## Program Year 2024

### SUCCESS STORY

David Brown –HUD Certified Housing Counselor

MCAEOC is a HUD-approved Housing Counseling Agency dedicated to meeting housing, foreclosure, and financial educational services for residents of Mississippi County. Two persistent problems affecting members of the low-income community are individuals' ability to purchase homes due to lack of financial educational awareness, as well as the lack of resources necessary to become a first-time homebuyer. Based upon MCAEOC's recent Public Hearing, housing ranked three out of ten of the most important needs within the Mississippi County area. Over the years, a vast number of low-income households has shown an interest in becoming a homebuyer; however, they simply were not prepared financially and lack the resources.



MCAEOC also has a HUD-certified Housing Counselor that consults with potential homebuyers in an individual or group setting to help make sure they are ready for the real cost and responsibility of purchasing a home. For those whom are interested in becoming a First-Time Homebuyer, they must first participate and complete MCAEOC's First-Time Homebuyers workshops. Upon completion, they have the opportunity to earn a Certificate of Achievement, thereby enabling them to commence in fulfilling the dream of owning a home. Some of the services the HUD Counselor provides are as follows:

- Assess their finances and assist in creating a budget to make buying a home easier.
- Check, evaluate, and analyze credit reports to ensure their credit is in order, so they can qualify for the best interest rate possible on a mortgage.
- Review the various costs faced as a potential homebuyer, such as service and inspection fees, moving costs, and maintenance or renovation expenses.
- Assist in the application process and provide insights on the changes to the mortgage application process.
- Assist potential homebuyers in the planning stages for buying a new home and walk them step-by-step through the purchasing process.

During the program year of 2024, MCAEOC's Housing Department has served and supported ten (10) individuals in achieving and finally realizing their dreams of becoming First-Time Homeowners! As a result, the following outcomes/services from multiple domains were attained:



- purchased a home,
- improved credit scores,
- obtained safe and affordable housing,
- received financial coaching and counseling,
- completed financial management programs (budgeting, credit management, credit repair, credit counseling, etc.),
- completed First-Time Homebuyer Counseling workshops, and
